



Not Just Another Black History Month Celebration

Black History Month, envisioned by Black historian Carter G. Woodson in 1915 and observed nationally since 1976, is a month-long celebration of the contributions and achievements of Black/African Americans in the United States. Held in February each year, Black History Month is bookended by the start of a new year and being recognized in the shortest month of the year which makes this time susceptible to rushed and/or celebratory facades.

In light of the recent racial reckonings related to anti-Blackness, institutional racism, and the Movement for Black Lives, now is the time more than ever to recognize and honor the struggles and triumphs in our histories, and to reimagine a richer future in which our voices are amplified and our lives are valued.

Don't let February 2022 be just another Black History Month. Let us not just show up for the obligatory, half-baked office party, engage in performative commemorations, or partake in our organizations' empty resolutions. Instead, let's take this opportunity to celebrate Black History Month in ways that uplift Black communities. Here are twelve ways, in no particular order, to recognize, celebrate, and honor Black/African American people during Black History Month and beyond:

- Sponsor a Black student or colleague.
- Support a Black business.
- Donate to a Black organization.
- Listen to and believe Black people about their lived experiences.
- Agendize and prioritize exploring issues that impact Black people in your



- organization.

 Give Black employees release time to participate in BHM activities and
- Institutionalize Black History Month activities by adding to your institution's calendar.
- Provide funding to Black employee resource groups and student organizations.
- Feature Black speakers in classes, presentations, and other institution-wide events.
- Include works from Black authors, artists, and creatives in curricula.
- Invest in learning about the Black histories, accounts and narratives that have been hidden, lost, or eliminated from your organization.
- Let Black people celebrate and be in community with one another without regulation, scrutiny, or fear.

The "Black Joy Parade is a hyper-positive nonprofit based in Oakland, CA that celebrates the Black experience and community's contribution to history and culture with its signature parade and celebration, partnerships and events" (https://www.blackjoyparade.org/about, n.d.).

The nonprofit organization that runs this event lists the following elements as cornerstones: Bold Blackness, Creative Expression, Economic Empowerment, and Unwavering Optimism. And, their website underscores their mission as "[providing] the Black community and allies a live experience that celebrates our influence on cultures past, present and future. We will unite a diverse community by creating a space to express each of our unique contributions to the Black experience. We invite you to be creative, be open, be present, be free."

Dr. Jeanne Wilson is Vice President of Las Positas College in Livermore, California. She formally served as the Dean of Special Programs & Services at Chabot College. Previously, she served as EOPS/CARE/CalWORKS Coordinator/Counselor at Chabot College, and held various other positions at the College since she started in 2001. As a first generation college student and an African American woman raised in a single parent home, Dr. Wilson is sensitive to the needs of underserved communities, and has spent her entire career promoting diversity and social justice for students of all backgrounds. Throughout her 20 years' experience working at Chabot College, she developed the first Umoja Promise cohort, secured funding to develop the first Guardian Scholars program to support former foster youth, and founded the Black Education Association (BEA) modeled after the Chicano Latino Education Association (CLEA). Core to Dr. Wilson's beliefs, she strives to provide an equal-opportunity environment that fosters respect and communication across gender, racial or other culturally different socioeconomic groups for students and staff. Dr. Wilson earned a Doctorate of Education in Educational Leadership from Mills College in Oakland, a Master of Science in Marriage, Family, and Child Counseling from California State University, East Bay, and a Bachelor of Arts in Marketing from The American College for Applied Arts in Los Angeles.
